ONONDAGA

Ptero Bud Muench, CG Av 192, recounted some of the exploits of two medium endurance cutters named ONONDAGA, one of which, in 1915, played an important role in the beginnings of CG Aviation. 2/Lt Norman Hall and 3/Lt Elmer Stone were young officers on board, conceived of a CG air wing and with support of their skipper, CAPT Ben Chiswell, obtained flights at a Curtiss flight school. Stone subsequently became CG Av #1 and piloted the NC-4 on its historic flight across the Atlantic in 1919. Chiswell, Hall and Stone are all enshrined in the CG Aviation Hall of Fame at ATC Mobile.

ASTRONAUT NEWS
